There is some exciting news in Dorset for the spring of 2019!

H.N. Williams Store, a Dorset fixture that began in 1840 will be expanding it's facility. The new project recently received it's final permits and is set to break ground in April of 2019. What was once the Rogers Corp shop will be removed and replaced with a new building that will offer an expanded deli, additional food/produce options with extended hours that will save locals on time spent traveling to Manchester. Gasoline and diesel pumps will be added as well. This is welcome news for anyone who has ever needed milk, eggs, or gas after 6pm in Dorset.

Pictured above is the new trail head kiosk for the Mad Tom Notch Trail in East Dorset Village. The project was completed as part of an Eagle Scout project by Ethan Lareau, youngest child of John & Ann Marie Lareau. Ethan coordinated with members of the community and the US Forest Service to plan, design, fund-raise, and construct the kiosk over the course of 2017-18. Ethan was able to gather the support of the community to move the project across the finish line. The work is high quality and the interpretative panels tell the history of the area. Did you know the Mad Tom Notch trail used to be a functioning carriage road to Peru Village?

In later years the Notch and the Mad Tom Brook were the site a large lumbering operation owned by Vermont's first millionaire S.L. Griffith of Danby.

Dorset is extremely grateful to Ethan for all his hard work on this project. The kiosk will serve the community for many years. Ethan's ability to carry out the project was impressive and we wish him the very best as he moves on to attend the UVM Forestry program in the fall of 2019. 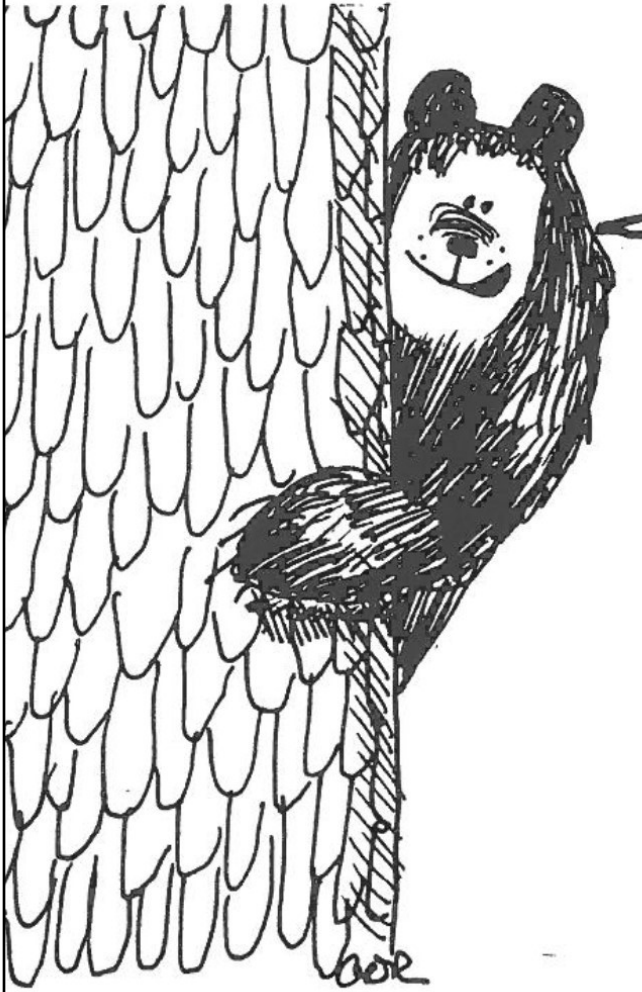
The featured artist at the Dorset Public Library during the month of February will be Mary Schwartz.

Update on Planning in Dorset

The Dorset Planning Commission is working with planning staff from the Bennington County Regional Commission (BCRC) to craft the required 2019 update to the Dorset Town Plan. During this process demographic and statistical information will be updated along with any additional items that the Planning Commission includes for mapping Dorset's land use in the future. Once the draft is completed the Commission will hold at least one Public Hearing prior to approving the plan and forwarding it along to the Selectboard.

The Planning Commission has also recently awarded a Municipal Planning Grant for a review of pedestrian safety and access in and around Dorset Village. The \$8,000 grant helped to bring in a Transportation Planner from the BCRC to research the current conditions and possible ways to improve them and make the Village more pedestrian and cycling friendly. The Planning Commission worked along with this group help give a background to the project. *Have you ever wondered why grass won't grow on the side of Route 30 near Meadow Lane?* Because of all the foot traffic using the road shoulder to walk. This is just one of the interesting points highlighted by the transportation planner and engineer in the study.

One exciting new concept that came from the study is the idea of linking Church Street to HN Williams through a shared use path or sidewalk. This section of Town is popular with walkers, runners, and cyclists but the road conditions and lack of road shoulder can make it difficult to navigate.

Kudos to the Planning Commission for thinking about small ways we can improve our Village to make it safer and more accessible for residents and visitors who want to leave the car parked and take a nice walk to enjoy living in such a special place. Legal voters of the Town of Dorset, County of Bennington, State of Vermont, are hereby warned and notified to meet at the Dorset School, 130 School Drive, Dorset, Vermont on Monday, March 4, 2019 at the hour of 7:00 o'clock in the evening to transact any business not involving a vote by Australian Ballot, and on the 5th day of March at the hour of 7:00 o'clock in the forenoon to transact voting by Australian Ballot as required by law.

(ARTICLES 2 & 4) will be voted by Australian Ballot on Tuesday, March 11th. Polls will open at 7:00 a.m. and close at 7:00 p.m. on March 12th.

- Article 1.** To hear and accept reports of Town Officers and take proper action on same.
- Article 2.** To elect Town Officers for the ensuing year. To be voted by Australian Ballot. Officers to be elected as follows: **Moderator, Town - 1 year term Selectman—3 year term Selectman—1 year term Selectman—1 year term First Constable—1 year term Town Agent—1 year term**
- Article 3.** Shall the voters authorize the collection of property taxes in two (2) installments on September 10, 2019 and March 10, 2020. Payments not received will be subject to 1% interest on September 14, 2019 and 1% interest and 8% penalty on March 14, 2020?
- Article 4.** Shall the voters approve the recorded Select Board's official budget as submitted with the Town report? To be voted by Australian Ballot.

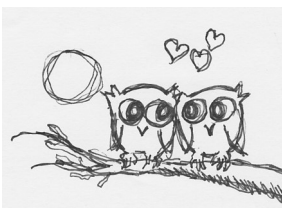

Winter 2018-2019 Newsletter from the Bennington County Solid Waste Alliance

The Bennington County Solid Waste Alliance (BCSWA) includes the Towns of Arlington, Bennington, Dorset, Glastenbury, Manchester, Pownal, Rupert, Sandgate, Searsburg, Shaftsbury, Stamford, Sunderland.

2018 and 2019 Household Hazardous Waste Events: In 2018 BCSWA held household hazardous waste events in Bennington, Searsburg, Stamford and Dorset. 484 households participated along with several businesses. The Alliance will hold the next event on Saturday, May 18, 2019 at the Bennington Transfer Station at 904 Houghton Lane in Bennington from 8:00 AM to 1:00 PM for the 13 Alliance towns.



Business and School Outreach: The Alliance reached 40 businesses in 2018 providing guidance on recycling, disposing hazardous materials, and properly diverting food scraps and organics from landfills. This past year, the Alliance worked with Mt. Anthony Union High School and the Dorset School on improving their recycling efforts. Visit Your Transfer Station: There are seven transfer stations serving the Alliance including the Bennington, Sunderland and Northshire Transfer Stations operated by Casella and the Pownal, Searsburg, Shaftsbury and Stamford Transfer Stations operated by and serving those towns. Transfer stations accept food wastes and several accept batteries, fluorescent bulbs, and E-Waste among other materials. Reduce Your Waste During the Holidays: Visit <http://foodshift.net/blog/8-tips-reduce-waste-thanksgiving/> on ways to reduce food waste during the holidays. Better meal planning, creative cooking with leftovers, composting, and giving extra food to those in need can all help reduce waste and save money. The BCSWA website also has a new section on donating food to food pantries. For the holidays, using recycled wrapping paper, avoiding unnecessary packaging, sending electronic cards instead of paper cards and other planning can save a lot of waste at this time of year.

Sharps: If you use sharps including needles, and need to dispose of them, visit our web page on how to seal them in a sturdy container for disposal. Sharps can't be recycled and are dangerous if not disposed of properly.



Be Careful What You Put Down the Drain: Many materials, especially household hazardous waste, should NOT be poured down the drain, either to a septic tank or field or to wastewater treatment plants. These chemicals are toxic, will kill the organisms that break down waste, and will enter surface and groundwater supplies. Flushing prescription drugs down the toilet should also be avoided as these have been shown to harm fish and amphibians. Batteries, Fluorescent Bulbs, E-Waste, Textiles and Paint: Many retail stores are accepting alkaline and rechargeable batteries, fluorescent bulbs, including both tubes and CFLs and latex and oil based paint for FREE! Goodwill in Bennington accepts clothing and has trucks on weekends in Arlington and Manchester for donations of clothing. There are textile boxes located all over Bennington County, including at the transfer stations, where you can donate clothing. Goodwill also accepts donations of clothing and other items. Visit them at www.goodwill-berkshires.com. Several of the transfer stations accept E-Waste, batteries, fluorescent bulbs and other materials. Residents & Business Owners invited to join or give input to the Raptor Lane Steering Committee:

The Dorset Selectboard is seeking applicants from the community to serve on the Raptor Lane Steering Committee. This is a great opportunity for those looking to become more involved with the community to address our needs.

The Town of Dorset recently acquired 308 acres located off Route 30 near JK Adams. The land is currently held as a subdivision with eight (8) lots total. Seven (7) of the lots range in acreage from 11 acres to 30 acres. Lot 8 is 160 acres in size. The property abuts the recently expanded Owls Head Town Forest. The Selectboard has visited the site and created a very preliminary list of potential options for the property.

The Town has recently commissioned an engineering study that will review the property for:

- Multiple units of planned housing;
- Relocation of Municipal Offices with inclusion of space for emergency services and community events;
- Educational/ Non-profit institutions;

Recreational options including a multi-use path(s);

This is an exciting time for Dorset, we have a unique opportunity to address the needs of our community through this project. The mission of the Steering Committee will be to review the many options, review the needs identified in the recent Northshire Economic Development Study, solicit input from the public and make recommendations to the Selectboard. The Committee will consist of nine (9) people, 5 representative from Town boards and commissions and 4 at large members from the community.

If you live in Dorset, work in Dorset, or just care about Dorset we hope you will consider participating on this Committee or giving us input!

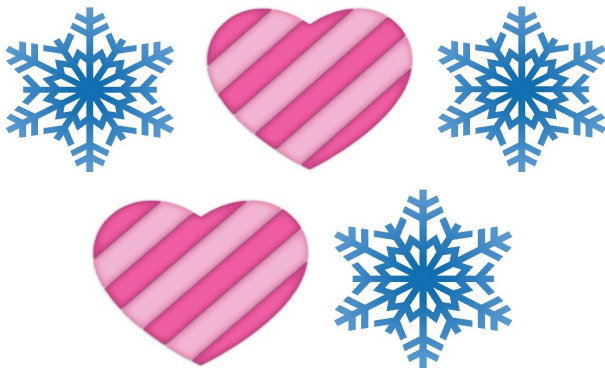
